A new facility with space for both dogs and cats has long been a dream of our volunteers, and within the next few years this dream will become a reality, there will be a new home for PAWS. Many people have asked where the new adoption center will be located. The board is reviewing a number of possible sites and we hope to decide on the location by the end of this year,

so stay tuned.

On November 20th, the annual PAWS Pet Extravaganza will take place at the Snider Ag Arena on the Penn State Campus. Come enjoy the fun – the activities are listed in the article on page 3. In addition, we will need volunteers to help with all aspects of this event - volunteer contacts also are listed in the article. During 2005, PAWS has held three low cost spay/neuter clinics (see page 4). These have been a great success and we plan to continue this program in 2006. Lydia Nolan has organized these clinics, and through the efforts of her team many unplanned litters have been prevented. In addition to these clinics, financial help is also available through SNAP, the Spay/Neuter Assistance Program. Every year, PAWS receives requests to rehome many

more animals than we can place, and these programs will help to reduce the number of homeless animals in Centre County.

While the winter holidays are still two months away, now is that time that our foster home coordinators, Diane Casher (cats) and Liz Strickler (dogs) begin to line up foster homes for PAWS dogs and cats for the holidays, approximately two weeks in late December. If you can open your home to a PAWS animal for that time, please contact them (see page 5 for contact information).

PAWS could not provide these programs or plan for a new facility to help the animals of Centre County without the generosity of the community. Whether you support PAWS through donations of time, supplies or money, your contributions make all of these activities possible. Thank you!

PAWS Launches \$1.5 Million Building Campaign

Official Press Release

It's official ... with long-time volunteers and local citizens looking on, Carla Hass, president of PAWS, announced the \$1.5 million campaign goal and kick-off to the public phase of fundraising for a new building, October 13th at Centre Hills Country Club in State College.

More than 150 community members attended the reception. Speakers included Fred Metzger, DVM; Debbie Bezilla, co-founder and current treasurer of PAWS; and Mike Siggins, architect. Guests viewed the proposed building plans for the new facility and a campaign video produced by Seven Three Media. They listened to testimonials of the good work PAWS has done educating and serving the Centre region for the past 25 years and why this campaign is

imperative for the group's growth and continued service to the community.

This ambitious endeavor is a milestone for the organization, which has provided the only non-euthanasia option for companion animals in the Centre region. But for all the good PAWS has done in the past, it aims to do more, and this campaign is the first step in that direction. The proposed building is 10 times larger than its current facility at 1042 Benner Pike, generously leased to PAWS

each year by Fred Metzger for \$1. The extra space would allow the group to double the number of cat kennels and for the first time allow PAWS to house dogs at its facility in addition to the foster program.

More Details on the PAWS Building Campaign

With the official kickoff of the building campaign, PAWS is beginning an exciting new phase in its on-going mission to aid and protect the homeless animals of Centre County. The goal of this campaign is to build and provide on-going funding for a permanent, 9000 sq. foot facility. This facility will provide space for 50 cat cages, 28 dog kennels, meet and greet rooms, courtyard for dogs, sunroom for cats, administrative offices, on-site medical treatment rooms, and space for a future on-site spay/neuter clinic. Quite a difference from the current 800 sq foot shelter which has space for 23 cat cages and no on-site space for dogs! The new building will also allow PAWS more opportunities to better collaborate with other animal welfare organizations within Centre County to accept and place animals when the only

other option is euthanasia.

PAWS has assembled an experienced Development Committee to ensure that the fundraising efforts are a success. The Development Committee is soliciting local, state and national foundations, community leaders and the citizens of Centre County for assistance in raising the needed funds. Naming opportunities exist for pledges from \$2,500 up to \$500,000.

The location of the new facility has not been determined. The Development Committee, along with the PAWS Board of Directors, is currently reviewing several locations that have been offered as potential building sites. The final location will be determined by both ease of access for the public, volunteers and staff, as well as local zoning ordinances.

PAWS would like to thank architect Michael Siggins for preparing the schematic plans for the new center at no cost and architect Michael Taylor for the guidance he has provided on the building project.

Adopt-a-Pet Thursday on Hot 103

Each Thursday, beginning at approximately 9:35 a.m., a PAWS cat or dog enjoys 5 minutes of fame as HOT103 (103.1 FM) radio's dog or cat of the week. PAWS volunteers Cathy Kassab and Nancy Slaybaugh alternate Thursdays, featuring a dog one week and a cat the next. The spot is hosted by Jama Close and Ken Prell for the express purpose of trying to find a loving, permanent home for that week's featured animal. The dog or cat's photo and biography are posted on the station's website (www.HOT1031.com) until the following Thursday. When practical, the featured animal accompanies Cathy

or Nancy to the station wondering, of course, what this "radio star" business is all about! No, the dog or cat cannot be seen by the radio audience, but we coach them on the benefits of talking into the microphone and sometimes they actually do! Having the animal in the studio also makes for more lively dialogue between the hosts and the PAWS volunteer. There are many animal lovers on the Forever Broadcasting staff, so Adopt-A-Pet Thursday has become a highlight for many not directly associated with the morning show. Tune in some Thursday morning – it's a fun few minutes.

Low-Cost Spay/Neuter Clinics a Huge Success

During the summer and early fall, PAWS sponsored three low-cost spay/neuter clinics to citizens of Centre County. The surgeries are offered at a significantly reduced price and help pet owners who otherwise cannot afford these procedures. This year's spay/neuter clinic coordinator was PAWS volunteer, Lydia Nolan. Lydia did a fantastic job of coordinating the events, securing locations for the clinics, coordinating volunteers, marketing, and working with the pet owners. PAWS salutes Lydia and all the volunteers who worked so hard to make these clinics a success.

PAWS would also like to salute Dr. Renee Calvert of Mountain MobileVet and her technician, Stef, for providing both the facility and the medical services for these clinics. They both worked

tirelessly at all 3 clinics and have the sore feet and hands to prove it. PAWS would not be able to offer these clinics without Mountain MobileVet's assistance and we are very grateful to Dr. Calvert and Stef.

So what impact did these clinics have? Over the course of the 3 clinics, a total of 51 cats and dogs were altered. At the clinic held in October, three cats were spayed and fifteen cats were neutered! Statistics show that in 7 years, 1 unaltered female cat and her offspring can produce 420,000 kittens! So you can see what a huge impact these clinics have on controlling the cat and dog population in Centre County and in reducing the strain on already overburdened shelters.

Unfortunately, many people choose not to spay or neuter for a variety of rea-

sons. Education is our biggest ally. Dispelling the myths surrounding spay/neuter surgery, providing financial assistance through SNAP (spay/neuter assistance program), and running low-cost clinics are all ways PAWS is working to reduce the pet overpopulation problem in Central PA. 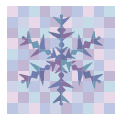

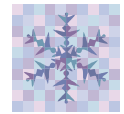

PAWS Dog Program Having a Great Year

The PAWS dog program has had a very successful year! By mid-October, we placed 138 dogs into loving homes!

Many people wonder where the PAWS dogs stay while they are waiting for their adoptive home to come along. We usually have between 20 and 30 dogs available for adoption at any one time. While these dogs are under the care of PAWS, we rely on foster homes to provide temporary homes. In addition, many of the PAWS dogs available for adoption stay at Lyons Kennels, Royal Pet Resort or Stone Valley Pet Lodge. Also, many owners who have surrendered their dog to PAWS are willing to "foster" their dog while PAWS works to find a home for the dog. We rely heavily on all three

sources for providing a temporary home for our dogs. We are thrilled at the prospects of having our own PAWS shelter that is designed to house over 20 dogs in the near future! Of course, we will continue to rely on foster homes and owners to also provide temporary homes, so we hope to be able to find homes even more dogs in the future!

Because the dogs are in foster homes, area kennels, and with owners, the dog program has made a concerted effort to show our dogs to the public. During the warmer months, we showed dogs twice a week (and sometimes more often if there was a special event). On Sundays, we showed dogs outside at the PAWS Adoption Center, and on Wednesdays we showed dogs at PetCo and

at Lyons Kennels (we alternated between the two locations).

With the colder weather coming on, we will be moving to indoor locations to show the PAWS dogs. Please see page 1 for a complete list of showings. The dates, locations, and times that we are showing the PAWS dogs is also on the PAWS website's Home Page and Dogs Available for Adoption page.

Because the dogs are spread across so many different locations, it requires a huge volunteer effort to coordinate showings. In particular, we need volunteers who can transport a dog from the kennel and handle the dog during our showing. The dog program also needs volunteers to help walk the dogs who are staying in kennels.

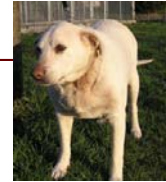

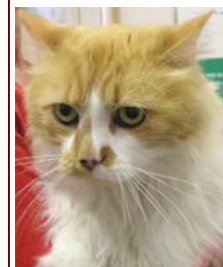
